This is a summary of how our school delivers music education to all our pupils across three areas – curriculum music, co-curricular provision and musical experiences – and what changes we are planning in future years. This information is to help pupils and parents or carers understand what our school offers and who we work with to support our pupils' music education.

Part A: Curriculum music

At Cedar Children's Academy years 1,2,4,5 and 6 follow the Sing Up! music curriculum. Year 3 are taught how to play the recorders. Each year group follows a termly scheme of work. The scheme outlines how support will be given to pupils with SEND and also provides support for those pupils needing further challenge. The Early Years Foundation Stage profile includes music statements that are covered in Reception and Nursery.

The schemes of work include between 3-6X40 minute lessons across the term.

Knowledge organisers are used alongside this to support with pupil's cognitive load and re-call of key information.

Part B: Extra-curricular music

Cedar Children's Academy runs musical clubs such as iRock and Dream Academy which provide pupils with further access to musical opportunities.

In addition to class teacher led lessons, Cedar benefits from a relationship with Dynamics and Medway Music Association. In partnership with Medway Council, they provide funding for professional recorder tuition for all year 3 classes (30 minutes per week) and peripatetic, small group lessons for 8 pupils. A music teacher also provides weekly tuition for pupils who would like to learn the keyboard or cello. Kent Music provide funding to cover the costs of this.

Parents may sign a consent form for their child to hire a cello through the Dynamics Instrument Scheme.

Part C: Musical experiences

Singing assemblies happen weekly for 20 minutes.

There is a cross-curricular approach to music and it is celebrated through a music display board within the school.

Pupils have the opportunity to take part in, 'Young Voices' and this year, pupils performed at the O2.

Year 6 perform an end of year show in which music plays a vital role.

The school advertises music events throughout the year from Medway Music Association which parents can sign their child up to. This included a summer music course, music technology online, music beginner course, an instrumental course and later into 2024, the Carol Festival, Recorder ensemble, Ukulele ensemble and Choral festival.

In the future

Throughout 2024-25 I plan to build on musical experiences for the children by providing additional resources to be used within the indoor and outdoor classroom. I will look at which instruments need replacing across the school to improve lessons and develop instruments within the early years that can be made using household items.
